Diocesan NFP Ministry

Diocesan NFP ministry provides instruction in natural methods of fertility

regulation and education on related issues. It is integrated into the structure of the diocese, with an NFP coordinator appointed by the bishop and having NFP teachers who are accountable to and work in cooperation with the NFP coordinator. The primary focus of diocesan NFP ministry is the provision of quality NFP services to married and engaged couples. (Standards for Diocesan NFP Ministry, p. 5)

> atural Family Planning (NFP) services offered under the auspices of a Catholic diocese have a two-fold purpose: they must teach NFP methodology, and they must also integrate the Church's teachings on human sexuality, conjugal love and responsible parenthood in NFP instruction.¹ A central aspect of this ministry includes integrating NFP information in pre-marriage and marriage enrichment programs.² Often chastity education is a component of this ministry as well as outreach education especially to clergy, health care professionals and educators. In its attempt to educate about and provide witness to God's plan for life and love, diocesan NFP ministry is an integral part of the Church's wider call to build a Culture of Life.

NFP ministry exists in the diocesan structure in a variety of forms. Most are programs of the office for Marriage and Family Life. Some are programs of a Catholic hospital or Catholic Charities. In a few dioceses, NFP is a diocesan department of its own, while yet others operate as a "federation" of autonomous providers to whom a diocesan staff person serves as liaison. A small number of diocesan NFP programs are separate organizations which operate with the "blessing" of the local bishop while remaining independent of the diocese. In dioceses where no staff person has responsibility for NFP, autonomous teachers provide the service. In such cases, often a parish priest will encourage and promote the work of such NFP teachers.

COMPONENTS	Regardless of the structure, well rounded diocesan NFP ministry should have the following components: ³
	 an episcopally appointed diocesan NFP coordinator and certified NFP teachers a program philosophy with clear goals and objectives including guidelines governing NFP education diocesan approved couple/client NFP curricula NFP classes a strong presence in marriage preparation programs educational opportunities for NFP teachers, couples/clients, and others in the diocese to learn more about NFP and Church teachings.
ACCOUNTABILITY	Accountability within diocesan NFP ministry is important. Ideally, NFP ministry follows a clear chain of command that looks something like this:
	 NFP teacher and other staff report to the diocesan NFP coordinator diocesan NFP coordinator reports to a supervisor (e.g., family life director, chancellor, etc.) who reports to the bishop or diocesan NFP coordinator reports to the bishop.

and follow-up to couples/clients. He or she conveys respect for each couple/client and promotes their autonomy in the use of NFP. By integrating Catholic teachings on human sexuality, marriage, and family life into their instruction, a diocesan NFP teacher encourages couples/clients to grow in their marital relationship. Diocesan NFP teachers are accountable to and work in cooperation with the diocesan NFP coordinator. (Standards, p. 9)

The diocesan NFP teacher is typically certified in the NFP system of his/her choice (e.g., BOMA, Couple to Couple League, Creighton Model Fertility*CareTM*, etc.). As part of the diocesan team, the NFP teacher is knowledgeable of and follows all diocesan NFP program guidelines (e.g., procedures for advertising NFP classes; requirements for record keeping or continuing education, attendance at meetings, etc.). If the diocesan NFP teacher ministers in a diocese that has implemented the *Standards for Diocesan NFP Ministry*, he/she will be invited by the diocesan NFP coordinator to meet those *Standards* (see *Standards*, pp. 9-12).

The Diocesan Development Program for Natural Family

Planning The Diocesan Development Program for Natural Family Planning (DDP/NFP) was established in 1981. It is a program of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' Secretariat for Pro-Life Activities. The DDP/NFP works under the guidance and direction of the Bishops' Committee for Pro-Life Activities and assists dioceses in conducting broad, decisive and systematic efforts "to make the natural methods of regulating fertility known, respected and applied" (see *Familiaris consortio, 35*).

The activities of the DDP/NFP include:

- ongoing individual consultation to assist diocesan NFP coordinators to initiate or develop diocesan NFP ministry
- publishing generic NFP resources
- providing periodic conferences for NFP coordinators, teachers and consultants
- co-sponsoring an academic conference focusing on the theology, philosophy, and science of NFP (proceedings are published)
- assisting dioceses in implementing the *Standards for Diocesan NFP Ministry*
- serving as liaison for the Catholic Church at the national level to non-sectarian NFP providers
- acting as a resource and archival center for the bishops and the NFP community.

The work of the DDP is augmented by a NFP National Advisory Board, whose members provide ongoing support on matters of importance to diocesan NFP coordinators and teachers. The Advisory Board is instrumental in helping the DDP/NFP staff review diocesan program information submitted for Endorsement under the *Standards*.

Helping

Helping couples to deepen conjugal love and achieve responsible parenthood is part of the Church's total pastoral ministry to Catholic spouses. Fulfillment of this ministry includes both education and pastoral care. This means instilling conviction and offering practical help to those who wish to live out their parenthood in a truly responsible way.
