International Conference on Catholic Indigenous ICCI

During the week of September 18 to September 22, 2023, the USCCB Subcommittee on Native American Affairs is hosting an International Conference of Catholic Indigenous. The Catholic Conferences from Canada, Australia, New Zealand, and with the United States will come together to dialogue, learn from, support and encourage Catholic Indigenous ministry. The Catholic Conference of Canada, Australia and New Zealand have been invited because of their common shared history of the Catholic church and their Indigenous communities. The meeting and events will be held in Washington D.C.

This Conference will be a historic opportunity for the four episcopal conferences to take advantage of common wisdom in ministering to their Indigenous populations. Bishops from these four conferences that work with Catholic Indigenous communities, support staff and their national Catholic Indigenous organizations will exchange of ideas, information about programs, and resources for the enhancement of Catholic Indigenous ministry during the first part of the Conference. The second part of the Conference will be devoted to a frank exchange between bishops from the four conferences and the Catholic Indigenous leaders. This first of its kind direct international dialogue between Bishops and Catholic Indigenous is designed to build trust and understanding and also to develop the future direction of Indigenous ministry.

The topics that will be discussed will be evangelization and education, reconciliation and healing, inculturation and social concerns such as poverty, racism and the environment. Many of the invited conference have developed programs to address these issues. One of the purposes of coming together is to learn from each other. They will explore the best ways to enhance and grow Catholic Indigenous ministry from their knowledge and experiences.

The other important aspect of this gathering is to develop relationships across borders and oceans. These relationships, not only with the bishops, but especially with Catholic Indigenous leaders will enhance solidarity within the global Catholic Indigenous ministries and help empower Indigenous ministry within the Church.

The concern from Pope Francis during his Canadian visit has underscored the need to listen to Catholic Indigenous communities and their leaders. Along with the Native Pastoral Framework, *Keeping Christ Sacred Promise*, that will be voted on by the General Assembly in November, 2023, this Conference is designed to refocus the importance of Indigenous ministry within the Church.
