

Religious Freedom, the Path to Peace, is the theme of Pope Benedict XVI's 2011 Message for the World Day of Peace, celebrated on January 1 each year. The Church teaches that religious freedom is grounded in the inherent dignity of the human person. The Holy Father's message affirms that all people have a duty and a right to seek religious truth and to practice religion in accordance with their conscience. Religious freedom allows deep and healthy relationships with God, oneself, others, and the world, and helps to form a society where peace can prevail, human development can occur, and the life and dignity of all can be respected.

Religious Freedom in the Holy Land

The Holy Land is sacred to Jews, Christians and Muslims, but a tragic, decades-old conflict has brought violence and suffering to its two peoples – Israelis and Palestinians – who yearn for a just peace. A just two-state peace agreement is essential for the future wellbeing of all the peoples of the Holy Land, including the Christian community, which is rapidly emigrating due to the difficult political and economic conditions imposed by the conflict.

The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops and Catholic Relief Services have worked for decades for justice and peace in the Holy Land, the place of Christ's birth and ministry.

Praying for Peace in Iraq

On October 31, a bombing of the Syrian Catholic cathedral in Baghdad killed 58 people and wounded 75. Shortly after, the U.S. bishops offered their prayers and expressed solidarity with the suffering Christians in Iraq.

Cardinal Francis George of Chicago, president of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB), said as part of his message:

"We stand with the bishops, Church and people of Iraq in their urgent search for greater security, freedom and protection. We call upon the United States to take additional steps to help Iraq protect its citizens, especially the most vulnerable."

Cardinal George also echoed Pope Benedict XVI's recent words: "Peace is possible. Peace is urgent. Peace is the indispensable condition for a life of dignity for individuals and society."
