

# Lectio Divina for July 22, 2025 Feast of Saint Mary Magdalene

We begin our prayer:

# Reading (*Lectio*)

Read the following Scripture two or three times. John 20:1-2, 11-18
2 Corinthians 5:14-17

Brothers and sisters: The love of Christ impels us, once we have come to the conviction that one died for all; therefore, all have died. He indeed died for all, so that those who live might no longer live for themselves but for him who for their sake died and was raised.

Consequently, from now on we regard no one according to the flesh; even if we once knew Christ

according to the flesh, yet now we know him so no longer. So whoever is in Christ is a new creation: the old things have passed away; behold, new things have come.

#### **Meditation** (*Meditatio*)

After the reading, take some time to reflect in silence on one or more of the following questions:

- What word or words in this passage caught your attention?
- What in this passage comforted you?
- What in this passage challenged you?

If practicing <u>lectio divina</u> as a family or in a group, after the reflection time, invite the participants to share their responses.

#### Prayer (Oratio)

Read the Scripture passage one more time. Bring to the Lord the praise, petition, or thanksgiving that the Word inspires in you.

## **Contemplation** (*Contemplatio*)

Read the Scripture again, followed by this reflection:

What conversion of mind, heart, and life is the Lord asking of me? What practices have taken me away from God's design for married love and the gift of life (e.g., contraceptive practice, use of pornography, etc.)? What resources (e.g., prayer, counsel, etc.) can help me avoid these practices?

The love of Christ impels us. Does my love for Christ spill over into my love for my spouse? How can love motivate me to be a better spouse and parent?

He indeed died for all, so that those who live might no longer live for themselves. How have my spouse and I sacrificed to make each other's life better? How can I share this love with others (for example, by considering foster care to help a child in need)?

Whoever is in Christ is a new creation. How does practicing a method of Natural Family Planning that requires periodic sexual abstinence—which can be sacrificial—strengthen my marriage? How can my relationship with Christ keep my marriage feeling new?

After a period of silent reflection and/or discussion, all recite the Lord's Prayer and the following:

## **Closing Prayer:**

O God, you are my God whom I seek; for you my flesh pines and my soul thirsts like the earth, parched, lifeless and without water.

Thus have I gazed toward you in the sanctuary to see your power and your glory, For your kindness is a greater good than life; my lips shall glorify you.

Thus will I bless you while I live; lifting up my hands, I will call upon your name. As with the riches of a banquet shall my soul be satisfied, and with exultant lips my mouth shall praise you.

You are my help, and in the shadow of your wings I shout for joy. My soul clings fast to you; your right hand upholds me.
