***Topline Report for In-pew Surveys in
Asian/Pacific Islander Catholic Parishes***

September 2015

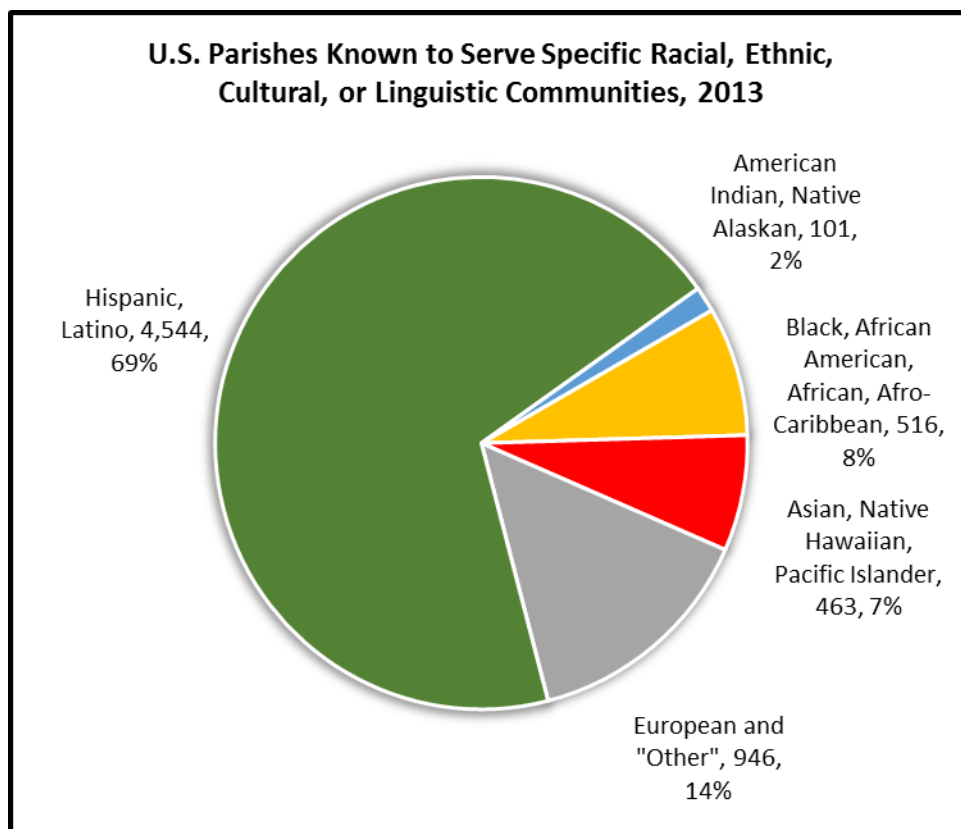


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Introduction

In February 2013 The Secretariat for Cultural Diversity in the Church of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) commissioned the Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate (CARA) at Georgetown University to estimate the size and distribution of Black or African American, Asian American or Pacific Islander, Hispanic or Latino, and American Indian or Alaskan Native Catholic populations in the United States, as well as the locations of Catholic parishes known to serve these communities. This summary report, commissioned by Dr. Tricia Bruce in consultation with the Asian Pacific Islands Affairs Subcommittee of the Secretariat for Cultural Diversity in the Church of the USCCB, highlights the findings for Asian Pacific Islander (API) parishes and respondents.

In 2013, CARA identified parishes that self-identify as serving or are known to serve racial, ethnic, cultural, and/or linguistic groups in the United States. CARA combined a dozen databases of parish addresses and information, including some provided by the Secretariat. CARA then cleaned the database of duplicates and updated any missing or incorrect information. CARA identified a total of 6,332 parishes that are known to serve a particular racial, ethnic, cultural, and/or linguistic community (35.9 percent of all U.S. parishes). Some of these parishes serve two or three of these communities. Accounting for this, a total of 6,570 communities were identified (as shown in the figure below).



In August 2014, CARA began conducting in-pew surveys with parishioners at randomly selected parishes identified by CARA in the first phase of the project (i.e., the 6,332 parishes serving communities) and later recruited to participate in the project.¹ In total, 30 parishes will be sampled and recruited for these surveys.² Dr. Bruce, who contracted for this report with CARA in September 2014, asked that CARA oversample API parishes and produce this summary report as well as the data set containing the oversampled API respondents.

This preliminary report represents findings for parish evaluation questions among the respondents in 26 parish communities that have completed the survey as of August 2015, 12 of which are identified as parishes that serve a majority or plurality of API parishioners. At the time of this report, additional parishes are scheduled to complete their surveys.

In total, 10,983 adults have completed their surveys in these 26 parish communities. The API oversample includes two parishes serving Filipino communities; two serving Korean communities; two serving Vietnamese communities; and six parishes that serve more than one racial, ethnic, cultural, or linguistic API community.

Examined in another way, six parishes primarily serve a single API community:

- Two parishes serve Filipino communities (located in Florida and Illinois)
- Two parishes serve Korean communities (located in California and Nebraska)
- Two parishes serve Vietnamese communities (located in Massachusetts and Pennsylvania)

The other six parishes serve multiple API communities (with the API communities ordered from largest to smallest populations):

- One parish serves Filipino and Vietnamese communities (located in Pennsylvania)
- One parish serves Filipino, Vietnamese, Chinese, and Micronesian communities (located in Hawaii)
- One parish serves Filipino, Vietnamese, and Korean communities (located in California)
- One parish serves Indonesian, Vietnamese, and Filipino communities (located in Pennsylvania)
- One parish serves Japanese and Filipino communities (located in California)
- One parish serves Vietnamese, Filipino, and Pakistani (located in Pennsylvania)

The survey, originally designed by CARA and the USCCB asks race, ethnicity, place of birth, and language. API respondents have checked the “Asian, Pacific Islander, or Native Hawaiian” box for the race and ethnicity question. To understand what API sub-groups a respondent might be in CARA examined the place of birth, language, and any response in the open-ended box for “other” on the race and ethnicity question. There are a total of 3,657 API

respondents. The largest identifiable segment of these individuals are Filipino (54 percent). More than a quarter API respondents (27 percent) did not provide sufficient information beyond their race and ethnicity to be identified in a sub-group. Other respondents are identified as Vietnamese, Korean, Indonesian, Japanese, Chinese, Samoan, Tongan, Sri Lankan, Micronesian, Malaysian, Cambodian, Bangladeshi, Indian, and Pakistani. Results in this report include findings specific to the three largest sub-groups: Filipino, Vietnamese, and Korean parishioners.

Preliminary Topline Results

Demographic and Religious Characteristics

The mean year of birth for respondents overall is 1964, with a median of 1963 and a mode of 1964. Those U.S.-born API respondents (1975) and those API respondents who used an English language survey (1966) are especially likely to have more recent average birth years.

Vietnamese respondents (53 percent) and U.S.-born API respondents (52 percent) are closest to having a 1:1 female to male ratio. U.S.-born API respondents (47 percent) are also most likely to have never married.

Vietnamese respondents are most likely to use a language other than English at home (89 percent use Vietnamese), followed by Korean respondents (83 percent of whom use an “other” language, likely Korean). U.S.-born API respondents (83 percent) are most likely to have responded to an English-language version of the survey.

Twenty-one percent of API respondents were born in the United States. Those identifying as Korean are *least* likely to have been married in the Catholic Church (52 percent). (That is likely related to those identifying as Korean being more likely to be non-Catholic or Catholic converts, which is displayed in a later table.)

API respondents are *less* likely than other respondents to be personally involved with at least one ministry or activity at their parish (24 percent compared to 43 percent). Among parishioners identifying with an API background, Korean respondents are most likely to be personally involved with at least one ministry or activity (52 percent).

Non-API respondents are more likely than those identifying an API background to be registered in the parish (71 percent compared to 59 percent). Those responding to the survey in a non-English language (82 percent) and those identifying as Korean (77 percent) are most likely to report being registered. API respondents are more likely than other respondents to currently live closer to a parish other than the one where they responded (58 percent compared to 48 percent).

Those identifying as Filipino (91 percent) or as Vietnamese (86 percent), foreign born API respondents (85 percent), and those responding to the English-language version of the survey (84 percent) are particularly likely to describe themselves as an active Catholic since birth. Korean respondents are most likely to describe themselves as non-Catholic (31 percent) or as converts to Catholicism (16 percent).

Eighty-six percent of API respondents have received their First Communion. Seventy-seven percent have been confirmed. Eleven percent have received the anointing of the sick. Korean and those who did not take the survey in English are among the least likely to have received their First Communion (72 percent and 75 percent, respectively).

Evaluations, Opinions and Needs Assessments

Eighty-four percent of respondents “strongly” or “somewhat” agree that parishioners are eager to understand the different cultures in their parish community. Those identifying as Korean (25 percent), those at parishes that serve a Korean community (25 percent), and U.S.-born API respondents (33 percent) are among the *least* likely to “strongly” agree with this statement.³

More than nine in ten respondents (92 percent) agree at least “somewhat” that having people of different cultural backgrounds enriches their parish. Those at parishes that serve a Korean community (30 percent), Korean respondents (32 percent), and those responding to the survey in a language other than English (49 percent) are among the *least* likely to “strongly” agree with this statement.

Nearly nine in ten respondents (89 percent) “strongly” or “somewhat” agree that their parish leadership and staff understand their culture. About eight in ten (81 percent) agree at least “somewhat” that they would like to see more priests of different cultural backgrounds in the parish. Eighty-two percent of parishioners agree at least “somewhat” that they would like to see more diversity in their parish. Most likely to “strongly” agree are those self-identifying as API (55 percent), those identifying as Vietnamese (51 percent) or Filipino (59 percent), and parishes with a plurality of API respondents (59 percent). Those at parishes that serve a Korean community (34 percent), those identifying as Korean (32 percent), and U.S.-born API respondents (46 percent) are *least* likely to “strongly” agree with the statement.
