Most Rev. Donald J. Hying is bishop of Gary. He was ordained a priest in 1989 and previously served as auxiliary bishop of Milwaukee.

Most Rev. James V. Johnston is the bishop of Kansas City—St. Joseph. Ordained a priest of the Diocese of Knoxville, he later served as bishop of Springfield—Cape Girardeau.

Most Rev. William J. Justice is auxiliary bishop of San Francisco. Ordained in the diocese in 1968, he served as pastor of several parishes before his episcopal ordination in 2008.

Most Rev. Gregory G. Kelly is auxiliary bishop of Dallas. Ordained in the diocese in 1982, he was ordained to the episcopate in 2016.

Most Rev. Carl Kemme is bishop of Wichita. An Illinois native, he was ordained to the priesthood in 1986 before his episcopal ordination in 2014.

Most Rev. Terry LaValley is bishop of Ogdensburg. He was ordained a priest in 1988 and consecrated and installed as bishop in 2010.

Most Rev. Peter A. Libasci is bishop of Manchester. Ordained to the priesthood in 1978, he previously served as auxiliary bishop of Rockville Center.

Most Rev. Jerome E. Listecki is bishop of Milwaukee. A Chicago native, he previously served as auxiliary bishop of Chicago and bishop of La Crosse.

Most Rev. Mikael Mouradian is the bishop of the Armenian Catholic Eparchy in the United States and Canada.

Most Rev. Walker Nickless is bishop of Sioux City. A Denver native, he was ordained to the priesthood in the Denver diocese until his episcopal consecration in 2006.

Most Rev. Armando X. Ochoa is bishop of El Paso. He was ordained to the priesthood in 1970 and previously served as bishop of El Paso and auxiliary bishop of Los Angeles.

Most Rev. Mark S. Rivituso is auxiliary bishop of St. Louis. A St. Louis native, he was ordained in the Archdiocese and served there until his episcopal ordination in 2017.

Most Rev. Jorge Rodriguez is auxiliary bishop of Denver. Born and ordained in Mexico, he ministered in Colorado and Rome before his episcopal ordination in 2016.

Most Rev. Guy A. Sansaricq is auxiliary bishop emeritus of Brooklyn. Born in Haiti, he was ordained in Port-au-Prince in 1960 and later served in as a priest and auxiliary bishop of Brooklyn.

Most Rev. Michael Cote is bishop of Norwich. He was ordained a priest in 1975 by Blessed Paul VI.

Most Rev. Andrew H. Cozzens is auxiliary bishop of Saint Paul and Minneapolis. A native of Denver, he was ordained a priest in 1997.

Most Rev. Thomas A. Daly is bishop of Spokane. Ordained a priest in the archdiocese of San Francisco in 1987, he previously served as the first auxiliary bishop of San Jose.

Most Rev. Bohdan J. Danylo is bishop of the Ukrainian Catholic Eparchy of St. Josaphat in Parma. Ordained a bishop in 2014, he is currently the youngest bishop in the U.S.

Most Rev. Robert P. Deeley is auxiliary bishop of Portland, Maine. Ordained to the priesthood in the archdiocese of Boston in 1973, he previously served as auxiliary bishop there.

Most Rev. Nicholas A. DiMarzio is bishop of Brooklyn. Ordained a priest in 1970, he previously served as bishop of Camden before his 2003 installation.

Most Rev. Michael G. Duca is bishop of Shreveport. He was ordained a priest in Dallas and ministered there until his episcopal ordination in 2008.

Most Rev. Daniel E. Garcia is auxiliary bishop of Austin. Ordained in 1988, he served as associate pastor and pastor of several parishes in Texas before his episcopal ordination in 2015.

Most Rev. Robert D. Gruss is bishop of Rapid City. He was ordained in 1994 and was a parish curate and diocesan vocations director, among other appointments, before his episcopal ordination in 2011.

Most Rev. Curtis J. Guillory, SVD is bishop of Beaumont. A member of the Society of the Divine Word, he previously served as auxiliary bishop of Galveston-Houston.

Most Rev. Joseph G. Hanefeldt is bishop of Grand Island. A Nebraska native, he was ordained to the priesthood in 1984 and ordained to the episcopate in 2015.

Most Rev. Gregory J. Hartmayer, OFM Conv. is the bishop of Savannah. He professed solemn vows with the Conventual Franciscan Friars in 1973 and was ordained in 1979.

Most Rev. Michael J. Hoeppner is bishop of Crookston. He was ordained to the priesthood by Blessed Paul VI in 1975 and ordained to the episcopate in 2007.

1. What are the implications of Pope Francis' call to missionary conversion in *Evangelii Gaudium* [EG] for your particular diocese, organization, etc.? How does EG and the Convocation complement and challenge your delegation's realities and experiences?
2. Chart out three strategic, measurable, and attainable goals for your diocese, organization, etc., to which your delegation might contribute. Consider, in the light of EG, what defines "success" for your delegation and how missionary discipleship can be fostered. What steps, both short- and long-term, would be necessary to achieve these goals?
3. Before ending the session, consider scheduling the next one or two meetings of your delegation to process the insights and lessons of the Convocation further, perhaps in late summer and/or in early fall, and close in prayer.

Most Rev. Gerard W. Battersby is auxiliary bishop of Detroit. A Detroit native, he was ordained a priest in 1998 and served in the archdiocese as a pastor and at Sacred Heart Major Seminary until his 2017 episcopal ordination.

Most Rev. Joseph R. Binzer is auxiliary bishop of Cincinnati. Ordained a priest of the archdiocese in 1994, he served in various positions before his episcopal ordination.
