## Interfaith Leaders Call on President and Congress to Reject Biased Religious Liberty Report

Archbishop William E. Lori, Chairman of the USCCB's Ad Hoc Committee for Religious Liberty, and Bishop Gregory J. Mansour of the Eparchy of Saint Maron of Brooklyn, joined leaders from diverse faiths in writing to President Barack Obama, Senate President Pro Tempore Orrin Hatch, and House Speaker Paul Ryan concerning a report released last month by the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights. The letter calls upon these political leaders "to renounce publicly the [report's] claim that 'religious freedom' and 'religious liberty' are 'code words' or a 'pretext' for various forms of discrimination." "On Oct. 7, I joined a diverse group of leaders, representing a broad spectrum of perspectives, in calling on President Barack Obama, Sen. Orrin Hatch and Speaker Paul Ryan to renounce the troubling claims put forth by the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights. The commission's document, titled 'Peaceful Coexistence,' recommends measures that purport to balance religious freedom and nondiscrimination laws. The choice of title would be humorous were the stakes not so high, for the proposed recommendations would achieve 'peaceful coexistence' by simply steamrolling religious concerns." Read more.


USCCB President: Gospel Serves the Common Good, Not Political Agendas "At this important time in our nation's history, I encourage all of us to take a moment to reflect on one of the founding principles of our republic - the freedom of religion. It ensures the right of faith communities to preserve the integrity of their beliefs and proper self-governance. There have been recent reports that some may have sought to interfere in the internal life of the Church for short-term political gain. Archbishop Lori says "The Glue is Missing" at Annual Red Mass in St. Louis "Now, it seems, we often lack the tools to have coherent discussions about things that really matter in our society. Indeed we seem to have lost the very framework for thoughtful discussion. We've forgotten how to think about the issues in ways that go beyond party politics, special interests, personal preferences, and sound bites. So what is the "glue" meant to hold together our very diverse and divisive society? How can we find at least a modicum of unity amid our differences? I would submit to you that the missing "glue" is nothing other than the natural law, that universal, in-born sense of objective right and wrong by which every person participates in the wisdom and goodness of the Creator."
