

Handout 2E: Racial Injustice and Poverty

The largest group of persons living in poverty today are non-Hispanic white persons – over 18.9 million Americans. These men, women and children make up 9.7% of the total white population.

By comparison, minority groups are three times as likely to live in poverty. For instance, the poverty rate among African Americans was 27.2% in 2012. That's more than one out of every four African Americans living in poverty. For Hispanics, the poverty rate was 25.6% in 2012. For Asian Americans, the poverty rate was 11.7%.

While poverty affects people across racial lines, a disproportionate percentage of those in poverty are people of color. Segregation, discrimination and other racial injustices that continue to exist may help to explain why this is true.
