# History and Background on September 9<sup>th</sup> National Day of Prayer

In 2016, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops called for a <u>National Day of Prayer</u> to be observed on September 9th, the Feast of St. Peter Claver. This initiative was introduced as a means to foster open, honest, and respectful dialogue within communities facing heightened tensions and acts of violence.

### Why September 9th?

September 9th is the Memorial of St. Peter Claver, who ministered to enslaved Africans. St. Peter Claver was a Jesuit priest from Catalonia who served African slaves in Cartagena, Colombia for 38 years, baptizing over 300,000 people. He died in 1654 and was canonized

by Pope Leo XIII in 1888. He called himself "the slave of the slaves forever" and is a patron saint of African Americans and of enslaved peoples. The Feast of St. Peter Claver is an occasion for heightened prayer and action to strive for peace in our communities.

## **Prayer Accomplishes Wonderful Things**

Reflecting on this Day of Prayer for Peace, Bishop Joseph Perry, chairman of the Ad Hoc Committee Against Racism, said: "We Christians believe that prayer accomplishes wonderful things for our families and communities. Prayer is the miracle salve for the ills of individuals as well as communities. The Lord Jesus promises that our prayer is heard by God. Let us never give up on prayer being able to bring us closer to God and to one another."
