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Shrine Mass remembers workers killed in Baltimore bridge collapse, sailors and seafarers

The annual "Mass for the Day of Prayer and Remembrance for Mariners and People of the Sea" celebrated at the Basilica of the Immaculate Conception in Washington honored the memory of six Hispanic workers who lost their lives in the collapse of the Francis Scott Key Bridge in Baltimore.

Taking place in the crypt of the basilica, the May 18 Mass included prayers to honor the men and women who have risked their lives and their vessels to ensure that supplies reach their destinations safely in times of peace and war.

At the beginning of his homily, Father Arthur Unachukwu, associate director of the Secretariat of Clergy, Consecrated Life and Vocations of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops, asked the Virgin Mary to bring comfort to the families

of migrant workers Miguel Luna, Maynor Yassir Suazo Sandoval, Dorlian Castillo Cabrera, Jose Mynor Lopez, Carlos Hernandez and Alejandro Hernandez Fuentes, who perished March 26. The six construction workers died after a large container ship lost power and collided into the bridge, precipitating its collapse.

"The collapse of the Francis Scott Key Bridge evidenced the high risk that dock workers face every day as they go about their workday. Let us pray to God for the eternal rest of our deceased brothers and sisters and ask the Virgin Mary to accompany the families and survivors in their time of grief," Father Unachukwu said.



The priest highlighted the role of the Catholic organization Stella Maris, which, after the freighter accident and bridge collapse, mobilized to offer spiritual and material help to the crew members of the cargo ship Dali, relatives of the victims, and

federal agents involved in the rescue, salvage and civil protection operations.

He also said that the “Church is always attentive to provide spiritual and human assistance to all her children,” especially to the people who work at sea, in the ports, and in the different maritime facilities, who, with their work, ensure the flow of goods around the world.

Father Unachukwu added that every May, different religious events are held in recognition of the “actions and sacrifices” made by sailors and port employees in tasks related to commerce and maritime transportation in the United States.



Prayers at the Rondel of Our Lady Star of the Sea

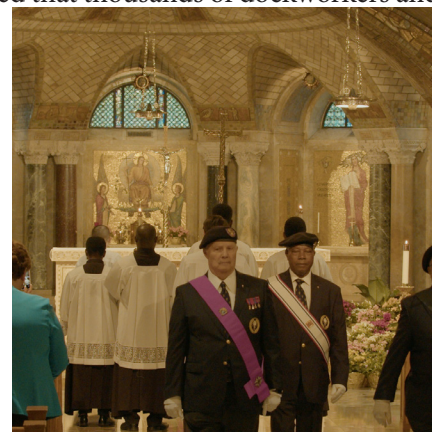
At the end of the Mass, those present participated in a procession inside the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception and prayed in front of the chapel erected in honor of Stella Maris.

In early May, Bishop Brendan J. Cahill of Victoria in Texas, the

bishop-promoter of Stella Maris in the United States, renewed his invitation to the faithful to support, remember, and pray for the men and women who make their living working on the seas, including merchants, sailors, seafarers, fishermen, port personnel and people in the maritime industry.

“Each year, we pray for those who work on the high seas and the ports. In a special way this year, we remember those who have been impacted by the collapse of the Key Bridge, particularly the six construction workers who perished in the bridge collapse, and for their families as they mourn the loss of their loved ones,” Bishop Cahill wrote in a press release shared by USCCB ahead of National Maritime Day, which is observed May 22.

He also asked the faithful to pray for the cargo ship’s captain and crew and the countless people who have been working in the aftermath of the tragedy, including the U.S. Coast Guard, Army Corps of Engineers, dive teams, first responders, construction workers, law enforcement, and government officials. He added that thousands of dockworkers and those who rely on the Port of Baltimore for work are still dealing with the impact of this tragedy.



“Worldwide, there are countless men and women who labor on the high seas for their livelihood – let us seek the intercession of Our Lady, Star of the Sea, that she protects and guides us,” he noted.

What is the “Stella Maris” Ministry?

“Stella Maris” is the official name of the Church’s Apostolate to the People of the Sea replacing “Apostleship of the Sea.” (AOS) “Stella Maris” from its Latin roots means “Star of the Sea.” It is one of the titles given to our Divine Mother, the Blessed Virgin Mary. This title Stella Maris is significant to us Catholics, because it gives us the assurance that Mary, our mother, is both our guide, and our protector in our ever-constant journey of life.

“Stella Maris”, is an international ministry of the Catholic Church which cares for the spiritual well-being and social needs of seafarers, their families, port personnel and all those who travel and work at sea. It was founded in Glasgow, Scotland, in October 1920. It was established to support seafarers in need. Today, for over one hundred years, it has been the largest ship visiting network in the world, providing seafarers with practical and

The Dicastery for Promoting Integral Human Development in Rome empowers countries and supports their initiatives for the growth of the maritime ministry. They provide guidelines and exhortations concerning pastoral ministry among the people of the sea; and ensure that the ministry is

carried out in a dignified and fruitful manner.



In “Stella Maris” ministry, we ask our Lady to guide, direct, and protect all Seafarers. As stated in the the Apostolic Letter *Motu Proprio* on the Apostleship of the Sea’ Pope John Paul II, January 31, 1997). ““Stella Maris” (“Star of the Sea”) has long been the favorite title by which people of the sea have called on her in whose protection

they have always trusted: the Blessed Virgin Mary. Her son, Jesus Christ, accompanied his disciples in their vessels (1), helped them in their work and calmed the storms (2). And so the Church accompanies seafarers, caring for the special spiritual needs of those who for various reasons live and work in the maritime world.”

In the United States, the Stella Maris ministry is organized through the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, Secretariat of Cultural Diversity in the Church / Pastoral Care of Migrants Refugees & Travelers. The chaplains of Stella Maris ministry assist seafarers to meet their basic needs and offer spiritual renewal, facilitate communications with loved ones back home, and offer recreational opportunities.

Due to the nature and lifestyle of seafarers, they are often away from their home parishes, and some have no parish setting to help them maintain lasting ties with their faiths. A network of Catholic chaplains and pastoral teams, including priests, religious men and women, deacons and lay ecclesial ministers work to serve people of the sea in a way that accommodates a seafarer’s unique lifestyle and needs, to continue the mission of Christ himself, in the maritime world, through Encounter, Service, and Celebration.

Stella Maris centers mostly operate as Catholic centers. However, some centers are ecumenical, and they provide services through the cooperation of two or more church denominations. In the United States, Stella Maris ministry is

present in 53 maritime ports in 48 Arch/dioceses and in 26 States. There are over 100 chaplains and pastoral teams who assist in the ministry.

As the National Maritime Day approaches, let us recognize the hardworking men and women of the U.S. Merchant Marine, seafarers, fishers, port personnel, and all who work or travel on the high seas for the vital services they provide in support of our nation’s economic well-being. Let us specially pray, that the Blessed Virgin Mary, Star of the Sea, would provide a light in the storm, and may that light guide all who sail in ships. Our Lady Star of the Sea, intercede and provide hope for all in distress. Our Lady Star of the Sea, pray for us. Amen.

Pastoral Visit to the Port of New Orleans May 18th, 2024

The Port of New Orleans located in Mississippi River is a significant transport hub located in Louisiana, United States. It brings all modes of transportation (ocean, barge, rail, and truck). It serves as an embarkation point for cruise passengers and Louisiana's sole international container port. It is so spread out and covers many terminals.

At the Mississippi River showing all the port terminals is around 45 different locations. Each one of these locations can dock multiple ships. Our area starts at mile marker 70 and goes up river to mile marker 130 which is a distance of 60 miles. There is a lot of area for chaplains to cover. The difficult aspect of the ministry is that there is an east bank and a west bank side of the river with only a few bridges where chaplains can cross. Not all the ships are docked at a land base facility, and so the chaplains must service some by a water taxi because the ships are anchored in the river.

NAMMA Distinguished Service Awards Presented to Fr. Sinclair Oubre



On February 15th, Fr. Sinclair Oubre, the Stella Maris chaplain in the Diocese of Beaumont, and Sharon Emerson, Executive Director of the Corpus Christi Seafarers' Centre, were presented with the Distinguished Service Award by NAMMA. The presentations took place during a celebration at the Houston International Seafarers' Centre, commemorating the 50th year of the port chaplain training course. Over 75 individuals gathered from the Port Houston community, seafarers' centres along the Gulf Coast, the NAMMA board, and current students of the course. NAMMA, the association of over 55 seafarers' welfare ministries in ports across North America and the Caribbean, organized the event.

Chaplain Michelle DePooter, Vice-President of NAMMA, presented the awards alongside Dana Blume, Secretary of NAMMA, and Dr. Jason Zuidema, Executive Director of NAMMA.

NAMMA's Distinguished Service Award, previously known as the Lifetime Membership Award, honours individuals who have demonstrated outstanding service to seafarers' welfare over many years, both within local seafarers' ministries and in other local, regional, national, or international capacities. Nominees are typically NAMMA members, part of a NAMMA affiliated agency, or significant partners with NAMMA's members in their programs.

Fr. Sinclair has been a longstanding member of NAMMA, having served as president of the Association for a term. He is a priest in the Diocese of Beaumont, Texas, and has served the people of the sea in various capacities. He graduated from the Houston training program in 1990 and has been deeply involved in the Apostleship of the Sea – USA

and the Port Arthur International Seafarers' Centre. His dedication extends beyond blue water mariners to inland mariners and fishers, supporting the Port Arthur Area Shrimpers Association for over a generation. In addition to providing pastoral and humanitarian care, he maintains his credentials as a licensed mariner by sailing annually, bringing a unique perspective to his role as Gulf Branch Secretary of The Nautical Institute and as a frequent speaker in industry and government panels. Fr. Sinclair will also be a speaker at the US Maritime Administration Mariner Work-Life Balance Symposium in April 2024.

In his remarks after receiving the award, Fr. Sinclair emphasized the significance of the maritime industry and the rewarding nature of a career in it. He stressed the importance of focusing on its positive aspects, highlighting its high-paying jobs and great benefits. He expressed his happiness in serving the people of the sea for many decades.

Has it Really Been Five Years?

The Point Comfort Seafarers Center can be traced back to the first ship visit made on April 24, 2019, to the FAN ZHOU 6. I am not sure who was more nervous, me or the Chinese officers I met. Fast forward to 2024 and we are approaching our first anniversary of opening the hospitality building inside the port. Along the way, we have delivered Christmas gifts over five holiday seasons, experienced a pandemic, talked with thousands of people from around the world and turned two empty portable buildings into a comfortable place of respite within walking distance of the docks.

We have made 1110 visits to vessels in port. Christmas at Sea has reached 4562 gifts donated and delivered. Our response to COVID included 240 care packages to remind ships they were not forgotten when no one was allowed

ashore and with the help of three medical teams, 313 vaccinations were given. We also fulfilled requests for seven Catholic Masses to be held onboard ships. Arranging a priest, or once a bishop, to visit a ship in port is a logistical puzzle to be sure. We have even hosted one school group that delivered their Christmas gifts to the center.

While the main boots on the ground have been Tom Wise and me, none of our success would have been possible without the support of many others. Tom says we have a cast of thousands like the 1959 classic movie *Ben-Hur*. He is not wrong. The Calhoun Port Authority has worked closely with us to make the new center truly accessible to the seafarers who need it. Local industries have donated money as well as items- from PVC siding and decking to shoe covers, cups, chairs, t-shirts, socks, and so much more. Numerous groups and people have donated items like magazines, shampoo, toothpaste, deodorant, candy, cookies, complete Christmas gifts and too many other items to list. Individuals have also given money for our building fund or other items as needed. We thank all of you for your support of our efforts to serve the world that visits Point Comfort.

CORPUS CHRISTI INTERNATIONAL SEAFARERS' CENTER Our 50th Anniversary

Back in 1972, a Norwegian seafarer suffered a stroke while his ship was in Corpus Christi. His wife and daughter came over from Norway to be with him in the hospital, but neither spoke English. Ben Hansen, a farmer and rancher in rural Corpus Christi, was called in to act as interpreter for the attending physicians. Born of Scandinavian parents, Ben was fluent in both Danish and Norwegian. His grandfather, in fact, was a Norwegian sea captain. "There is something about the sea," Ben offered, "that stays in a Scandinavian's blood. You always want to go back to the harbor." Ben did go back to the harbor in 1974, embarking on a volunteer scripture ministry to seamen from around the world.

At that time, the Port of Corpus Christi was the ninth largest port in the country, yet visiting seafarers had no place, off their ship, to socialize while in Port. Most all of them walked from the docks to downtown Corpus Christi with their crewmates to grab a cold beer and some relaxation. The only place they could go were the rough downtown bars; they didn't know where to go to make



phone calls or where to go to buy food and souvenirs. Unfortunately, they were almost always assaulted on their walk back to their ship and robbed of their meager earnings. The Corpus Christi Police Department asked for assistance to alleviate this problem, and a handful of volunteers, including Alice Milloy who retired from the Center when she was 96 years old, created the Seamen's Center in 1974. Because of this project, the crime rate in the community, according to the Police, was reduced by forty percent.

Considering the urgency of the matter, the City of Corpus Christi donated space in the old Parks and Rec building, where the volunteers created a model Seamen's Center and opened its doors on December 14, 1974. This "pet project" grew steadily along with the growth of the Port of Corpus Christi. At present, the Seafarers' Center is housed in a 5,500 square foot facility which is only blocks from the ship channel and docks -walking distance. The Diocese of Corpus Christi, through the John G. and Marie Stella Kennedy Foundation, funded \$335,000 to design and build the Center.

Although the original founders of the Seamen's Center have passed on, they would be proud to know that their legacy and dreams have been preserved and continued. I come from a legal background, and would go to the Center to assist Alice after work and on the weekends. When Alice's five children asked her to retire, it became incumbent on me to take up the reins. I quit my paralegal job and started with the Seamen's Center fulltime. I must say, that this is more of a calling than a job.

During the pandemic, all seafarers were restricted to their ships and could not go home during crew change and the relief crew were not allowed to board the ship to work. The onboard crew worked months beyond their contracts, the relief crew could not join the ship and were without a job and without pay. Very unfortunate for both sides. Because of these restrictions, the onboard crew was not getting vaccinated. In desperation, I cre-

ated a plan with the help of the Texas National Guard and our County Health Department, along with ship Captains and local ship agents, to allow the Guard's medics and support personnel to board ships and vaccinate members of the crew who wanted to be vaccinated. Once started, this project took on a whole new meaning. It meant that there was hope for these vaccinated seafarers to complete the first step in going home. During the course of this one-year project, we vaccinated 4,897 seafarers on over 650 ships! All at no cost to the seafarer, the agent or owners.



We send advance notice of arrival requests to Captains to advise them of our services, whether it be transportation, sale of Sim cards, chaplaincy or any other ways we can assist. We ask them to let us know, before their arrival in our Port, if they or any of their crew need any of these services so we will be ready. Whether they need our services or not, our driver and chaplains take a Welcome-to-the-Port bag containing a jigsaw puzzle, big bag of chocolates, big box of cookies, bag of microwave popcorn and assorted magazines to the ship. And in carrying on Alice's generous Christmas-at-Sea tradition, we stuff 1,000 Christmas bags with gift items to be distributed to the seafarers at Christmastime. These backpacks always contain a knit watch cap, a pair of Hanes socks, magnets, a Texas mini-calendar and a couple of branded items we choose each year.

Our Center is gradually making new interior upgrades to make the seafarers' visit a comfortable and pleasant one. We received a nice donation from Cheniere to upgrade our computer room to the Mariners' Lounge, complete with new paint, new flooring, new furniture, including a very large television, computer and lighting. This pleasant room has been used consistently

during crew changes; whether they sleep, chat, watch sports or catch up on their emails.

Our fundraisers, St. Patrick's Day Authentic Irish Dinner in March, our HEB Chicken & Sausage BBQ in June, our Annual Lobster Feast in October and our Christmas Open House in December sustain us, along with the payment of ship assessments provided by the Port Tariff, to carry on our mission to seafarers and insure that they are all warmly welcomed to our Center and by the Chaplains who board every ship they can, rain or shine. For 50 years, our Seafarers' Center has been a home-away-from-home, connecting seafarers by fellowship, pastoral care, comfort and the support they need to stay healthy and safe.

Heavenly Father, guide and direct all who control the conditions under which the seafarers labor at sea. Enlighten and uphold all who minister to their needs ashore. Give to those who commit their possessions and their lives into their keeping a full realization of the fidelity with which this stewardship is discharged.

pray for seafarers, pray for us.



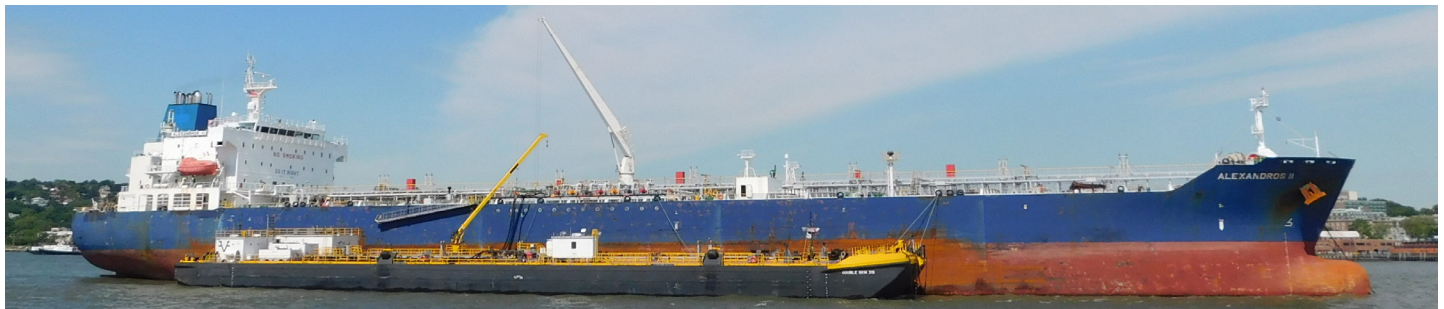
