In autumn 2017, Bishop Robert Gruss formally opened the canonization cause of Nicholas Black Elk, a Native American medicine man from the Lakota tribe in South Dakota who became a Catholic catechist and spiritual leader among the Native American people. With a Catholic faith that incorporated his Lakota traditions and culture into a life of missionary discipleship, Nicholas Black Elk led many to the faith. He showed that Native American spiritual and cultural traditions are gifts that enrich the life of the Church.

With production support from the Catholic Communication Campaign (CCC), the documentary Walking the Good Red Road: Nicholas Black Elk's Journey to Sainthood aired on ABC-affiliated television stations in 2020 to introduce people to this remarkable holy man.
